Elizabeth Freeman Process Paper

When deciding to compete in this year's National History Day, we aimed to do research on someone we knew very little about prior to our research. Our hope in doing this was to increase our understanding of the many people who go unsung in their effects on the world we know today. While researching various people, Riley recalled the quote by on our homepage, but not the person. After finding that Elizabeth Freeman had said this, we read about her story. It became clear to us that her stand to win her freedom was monumental in the ending of slavery in many northern states. As such, we continued with research about this unknown woman.

The research done was difficult and broad. Factors of the time period and the unexplored nature of her story made it tedious to find in-depth information. As such, we had to sift through photo galleries, documentation, websites, videos, and books to find tidbits of her story and slavery in the north at this time. Additionally, we interviewed our history teacher about the background involved with her court case, notably outside factors from the time and location this occurred. We also met with a local Commissioner in the Davis county court system, T.R. Morgan, to further understand the proceedings of court hearings and the research involved. From these meetings we learned directly how her stand had the proper social ingredients to spark a change nationwide, as well as conclude that her court would likely be used as a precedent in similar trials to come. With the background knowledge to present, the next step was deciding our category.
